WEED SPRAYING


On June 19th, the pond and other common areas are being sprayed for noxious weeds. Please make sure to have your vehicles off the common areas and keep your pets away while spraying and drying. If anyone would like to have the commercial sprayer that Meadowbrooke is using spray your personal properties, let us know, and we will be happy to pass on their information to you. There is a substantial saving to you for having them spray your property the same day the development is being done, and we generally have several members take advantage of the opportunity.



The HOA will be spraying right-of-way's and common areas again in late spring/early summer. We all need to take the necessary steps to control noxious weeds on our properties. Spraying needs to begin early enough in the year that the weeds do not seed (if they seed, the spraying is ineffective). Generally speaking, homeowners spray multiple times throughout the growing season to stay on top of our worst offenders, like Houndstongue and Thistle. It is not uncommon to have to spray weekly to bi-weekly to manage a bad infestation. Should anyone like to use the commercial spraying company that the HOA uses, let us know, and we would be happy to provide their information. We are also available if you would like help identifying some of our problem weeds that are often seen in the area. Most have found that Roundup is not the best option for killing our most challenging weed, the thistle. The go-to chemical in the development is 2-4D. You will find it at CHS & Murdochs. Remember you will need to purchase an activator separately to have it properly adhere to the plant.



As we approach summer, many of us will be burning debris. Please be aware of the Flathead County burning dates and regulations before you burn. We ask that you take all precautions during this burning process protecting your property, and neighbor's as well. Refer to <u>firesafekalispell.com</u> for updated information and helpful tips on how to burn trimmings safely.

Currently, the burn dates are as follows:

- March 1 April 30, Spring Open Burn
- May 1 June 30, Permits required (FREE)
- July 1 September 30, No burning allowed
- October 1 November 30, Fall open burn
- December 1 February 28, No burning allowed
- No permits are required during spring and fall open burn seasons

DEFENDERS OF WILDLIFE ELECTRIC FENCE INCENTIVE PROGRAM



As many of us desire to have a more self-sustaining lifestyle, we are seeing a significant increase in fellow neighbors growing gardens, having fruit trees and raising chickens. With these activities, we run the risk of predators damaging our efforts and running amuck. The Defenders of Wildlife has an excellent incentive program in the Flathead Valley, which provides a 50% reimbursement or up to \$500 toward bear deterrent electric fencing. The group will walk you through the recommended fencing, and will even help install the deterrent if needed. For those of us that have gardens and chickens, this is a great program to take advantage of.
